SPIRIT OF AMERICA Celebration Monday, July 4th Gates open at 4:00 pm

Get ready for Legacy Park's biggest event of the year -- the July 4th Spirit of America Celebration! This year's party promises to be the best ever. Rockin' music will be provided by an interactive dj and emcee and our headline band Run for Cover, who gave one of the most popular performances in our 2004 Summer Concert Series. Notes from The Board . . .

The Board voted to move up the start date for our property monitors. This was due in large part to problems we have been having at the basketball court. Since April 22nd, our property monitors have done a very nice job of policing our grounds and making sure people using LP amenities not only live here but also are in good standing with the HOA.

Our monitors are also checking the parking lots for cars that do not have parking stickers. You may have seen a car with a "ticket" on its windshield. This is a warning to let the owner know that the next time he is parked in our lot without the proper decal the vehicle will be towed. Monitors also have the authority to tow vehicles without issuing a warning if necessary. PLEASE get your window sticker in your vehicle if you plan to park in an LP lot. (Guest parking passes available in the HOA office.)

One last thing, please remember that even though you may have double faulted on your serve, missed the game-winning free throw, or dropped the touchdown pass, we are still a family community and cursing is not allowed....

OLD BUSINESS:

Clubhouse Update: Final cost with value engineering \$1,300,000.

Motion made to drop all funding for this project. Not approved (2-2-1).

Clubhouse Survey: Presentation coming in May.

Committee Hierarchy: Approved as recommended (3-0-1).

Activities: The Bunny Breakfast and Eggstravaganza were huge successes.

NEW BUSINESS:

An additional checking account was approved. Checks and balances are in place, and this account is only to be used only when regular payments and check issuing will not work (3-0).

Landscaping: \$50,000 was requested to upgrade the landscaping at our entry circle. Motion tabled.

Amenities and Common Areas: Property monitors are to start 4/22 (4-0).

Water Aerobics: Motion made to allow water aerobics to continue to be taught in our pool. Approved (3-0).

Pool Hours: A request was made and the Board is looking into extending pool hours.

May I See Your ID, Please?

LP residents 12 years of age and older must have an LP picture ID at all times while on the property or at any amenity. Persons who do not have their ID or exceed the resident/guest ratio will be asked to leave the area. ID tags are the property of the HOA and must be shown when requested by authorized personnel. Please note that any misuse of the amenities or breaking of rules may result in the suspension of amenity privileges.

LP properties and amenities are for the enjoyment of residents and accompanied guests only. Up to 4 guests will be allowed per resident over the age of 18 for use of LP property, amenities and community events (Exception: at the basketball court and baseball field one guest only). Unaccompanied children between the ages of 12 and 18 are allowed only one (1) guest while on LP property and when using the amenities. An LP resident must accompany guests while on the common properties or while using any of the amenities. Long-term guests, persons visiting for more than 2 weeks, may obtain a guest pass from the HOA office. Homeowners are responsible for ensuring that guests are informed of the rules of LP and that guests follow the rules at all times. The HOA reserves the right to suspend privileges or prosecute an individual, resident, or guest, for destruction, abuse, or misuse of property.

POOL REMINDER:

Children who are not potty trained are required to wear both swim diapers AND rubber pants in the pool.

Tip of the Month: Playing in the Heat

Playing in the heat is never easy, but - if you follow these simple tips - you'll give your body the best ammunition to stand up to the summer weather.

PRE-MATCH Hydration

The body is made up primarily of water, so it's vital to keep your water intake as high as possible when pushing yourself to the max in hot, humid conditions. Keep away from coffee and tea, as they are diuretic drinks. If you must get your caffeine shot, then drink water at the same time so you won't dehydrate your body. Carbonated drinks should also be avoided for the same reason; so again, if you must grab a can of your favorite soda, then be sure to drink some water, too.

Fuel

It's important to eat a balanced diet with lots of fresh fruit and vegetables. Protein should come mainly from chicken, fish, and lean red meats. One of the most overlooked aspects of eating and playing is the digestion of food. It's important that enough time has elapsed between the end of a meal and the beginning of your match or practice session, so your body has the best chance of working to the best of its ability. Two hours is a good rule of thumb for wait time.

Another important point to consider when warming up for a match is clothing. Although the latest fashion may state that black is cool, try to wear light colored clothing to ensure that the sun's rays are reflected and not absorbed by your body. The same goes for caps - wear a white cap, so that your head doesn't absorb as much heat.

MATCH Hydration

It's very important to drink BEFORE you feel thirsty. Once you feel thirsty, your body is already functioning below par and your performance will suffer. Drink small sips as frequently as possible, as opposed to gulping down large quantities of water every now and then which will result in you feeling bloated.

Fuel

Try to prevent energy loss with small amounts of food during the course of a match. Bananas are an excellent source of minerals which are lost through perspiration. Protein bars are also an excellent source of energy if you need a quick lift.

POST-MATCH

Your aim post-match should be to replenish your body with everything that you lost during the match, and the best time to do this is within 20 minutes of coming off court. Again, little and often is the order of the day, and try not to make the mistake that most people make - waiting until their next meal time before eating.

Investment Focus: Are You Heading Toward Financial Independence?

It's getting closer to Independence Day - time for fireworks, parades and picnics. Of course, it's enjoyable to celebrate this national holiday. But why not also use this occasion to think about achieving more kinds of freedom in your own life? Specifically, why not begin taking the steps necessary to attain your own financial independence?

What are these steps? Consider the following:

- **Reduce your debt load** - Try to do whatever you can to pay down your debts - especially the high-rate credit card debt. The more you have to pay on your credit cards or other consumer loans, the less you have to invest.
- **Build an emergency fund** - Try to create an emergency fund consisting of six to twelve months' worth of living expenses. Because you may need quick access to these funds, you'll want to put them in a liquid vehicle, such as a money market account. If you don't have an emergency fund, you might constantly end up dipping into your investments to pay for big-ticket items, such as a new appliance or a major car repair. And the more you cash out your investments for short-term needs, the slower your progress toward your important long-term investment goals.
- **"Max out" on retirement plans** - Ultimately, your financial independence should culminate in a retirement in which you can do pretty much what you choose. But to reach that point, you will need to accumulate sufficient financial resources. Consequently, you will want to try to contribute the maximum amount each year to a traditional IRA, which provides tax-deferred growth of earnings, or a Roth IRA, which offers tax-free earnings, provided you meet certain conditions. Also try to contribute as much as possible to your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored, tax-advantaged retirement plan.
- **Pay yourself first** - After paying all your bills, you may find it hard to come up with extra money to invest for the future. So, pay yourself first. Consider setting up a bank authorization to automatically route a certain amount of money each month into an investment. As you

get salary increases, increase the amount of money you put away.

- **Build a diversified investment portfolio** - Many people think they can become financially independent by buying "hot" stocks and getting rich quick. But, in reality, that hardly ever happens. By the time you buy a hot stock, it may already be cooling off. Furthermore, if you're constantly selling some types of stocks in pursuit of those big gainers, you'll rack up big commissions and other fees. We believe in building a diversified portfolio of quality stocks, bonds, and other investment vehicles - and then holding them for the long-term. Consider selling if your investment goals change or the investments consistently fail to meet your needs.
- **Try to protect yourself from large financial risks** - Injury, illness and infirmity can rob you of your ability to earn income and preserve your assets. That's why you may want to purchase the appropriate protection vehicles, such as disability insurance to replace lost income or long-term care insurance to cover the enormous costs of an extended nursing home stay.

It will take many years for you to reach the point where you can truly feel as if you've reached financial independence. But by following the suggestions listed above, you may speed up the journey.
